That was the first line of my new year's message that I had written, but after a call about a major water leak from the apartment above the gallery, I find myself rewriting my message a bit. I was excited to share that the arts center was off to a good start to a New Year, thanks to your generosity and a team of hard working volunteers. In case you didn't know, the arts center closed over the holidays for gallery renovations. Heather Hennigan and Judy Van Wei took the lead on the gallery renovation project to contract and recruit volunteers to help freshen up the gallery and make it an even more inviting and engaging space to visit. The walls were patched and painted and an updated member gallery and check-out area was in the works. Luckily, in the process, the show art was taken down and covered with plastic so when the water poured into the gallery though the ceiling little art was damaged. As I write this, the new landlord's team is in the gallery cleaning up water logged debris and assessing the damage of the gallery lighting, ceiling and floor. Although we planned on reopening the newly renovated gallery on January 8th, we may need to make adjustments to the timeline. We will be posting updates on our website and Facebook page. The good news is the pottery studio was not affected much, so pottery classes and open studio will stay as scheduled, and if need be, we may relocate some of our upcoming 2-d classes. We are truly grateful for the dedicated volunteers who came out in between the holidays to work on these improvements (see our volunteer section for highlights). We are especially grateful for the great job they did of covering the art with plastic –that proved to be of vital importance. So I am still hopeful for the new year and looking forward to a renovated space that will be more enjoyable to visit, shop and get inspired. We are grateful for your support and willingness to help. We truly hope you become more involved in the arts center this year!



Five-Week Beginner Wheel Throwing

Instructor: Ann Buchau

Dates: Wednesdays, January 7, 14, 28 | Feb 4, Feb 11

Time: 6:00 pm - 8:30 pm

Fee: \$93.75 per class members/ \$125 non members*

Learn how to throw basic forms using the potter’s wheel. Your instructor will guide you step by step as you learn how to wedge, center and create simple vessels. You will also learn trimming techniques and how to successfully glaze your pots. Students enrolled in this class will also have the option to come in during a designated time on Tuesdays (6-8:30 pm) or Friday (1-4 pm) to practice and work on their pieces. (Although there will be a monitor, there is no instructor for the open studio.) Total class time is 12.5 hours with the option of an additional 20 hours of open studio time during the class session. Alcohol Inks on Ceramic Light Switch Tiles

In this class, you’ll transform an ordinary ceramic light switch cover into a functional piece of art using vibrant alcohol inks. Needle-Felting Landscape

Unwind and create something beautiful in this relaxing two-hour needlefelting landscape workshop with artist and instructor Brooke Morse. In this beginner-friendly class, you'll start with a felt background and learn how to punch colored wool into the felt using special felting needles to build soft, layered textures. Brooke will walk you through techniques for blending fibers, creating horizon lines, and adding simple landscape details like trees, hills, and sky gradients. No experience is needed. Join us on Saturday, January 10th for a full-day field trip to the Corning Museum of Glass! We will depart at 8:00 AM and return at approximately 6:30 PM. Note: Group transportation will be provided by bus from and to the art center. During our visit, students will participate in a hands-on glass blowing workshop taught by professional instructors at the museum, enjoy a guided tour through the world-renowned exhibits, and also have time to explore the galleries individually. Students may bring a packed lunch or purchase lunch at the museum café.

In addition, during our final week of this session, students will continue their glass education back at the Art Center with a glass slumping experience taught by glass artist Heather Hennigan. This will allow students to expand their understanding of how hot glass and cold glass work — from blowing to shaping — creating a truly full-circle glass art experience.
